We have recently had a problem with crime in the area to both the public and businesses. These give me major concerns. These are theft or damage to cars, items from peoples property and dogs and cats from peoples gardens. Please make sure that doors and windows are locked on an evening and our elderly residents during the day if possible. Ladies when going out with a handbag or shopping bag please make sure that purses and mobile phones are not on view and if possible keep an eye on you much loved pooches when they are outside in your garden.

Litter once again is still a major problem along with fly tipping. Yes we have an amazing team of volunteers with SERV at Stainforth 4 ALL, but why should we have to have people out in all weathers picking up our mess. Please put items in your pocket or bag and either put it in a litter bin or your own black bin or recycle bin or box when you get home. Flag will now take up to 8 items you want taking to the skip. They do charge £30 for this service so why not ask friends, family and neighbours if they along with yourself have any items that need taking and split the costs. They will now take items in black bin liners that you want to dispose of, just advise when you phone them for a collection what you want taking. This saves items being dumped on street corners or down back lanes. Please note that they do remove broken fridges, fridge freezers and freezers.

HISTORY



This image is taken from the 1950s/60s on Church Road looking towards Station Road. Is this when Stainforth had quite a few small shops. These shops were built in the 1920s to serve the new mining community. The shops on this road includes Mumby's, Fowler's Fish & Chips, Parkins' Chemist, Salvation Army, Boye's The Barber, Brough's, Morgan's & Store, Randall's Butchers, Co-Op, Waterfields, Atkinson's Bakery, Kingsway, Clarkes Grocer

(later changed to Whittakers), Riggots Family Butcher. Businesses were thriving and gave employment to the local people. From the 1970s the shops started to close and were vandalised. A number of reasons for this included people started to shop outside Stainforth once they had cars and could travel to supermarkets as it was better value. Some people say the miners strike or the closure of Hatfield Main Pit were also a contribute to the demise of the shopping areas.

This picture on the right is taken in February 2018. Today the shops on Stainforth Road consists of Little Mims Café, Stainforth Credit Union, Stainforth Express, Mumbai, Spartans Gym, Angela's Florist, Taste of China, Richard Laws Fruit & Food, The Salvation Army, Ghost Vape & Co, Stainforth Carpet Centre, Simply Local, Asda, Bengal Curry House, William Hill Woody's Café, and the petrol station. It goes without saying but you want these shops to stay or more to open in Stain-

forth 'if you don't use it you'll lose it'. When you buy from a small business, you're not helping a C.E.O buy a third holiday home. You're helping a little girl have new uniform, a little boy have some new trainers, Mum and Dad to be able to put food on the table. 
Neighbourhood Plan

On the 9th March, Stainforth 4 ALL held the launch of the Neighbourhood Plan for Stainforth. You might think what's that? Well... a neighbourhood plan is a way of helping local communities to influence the development of the area in which they live and work. A neighbourhood planning system is essential for supporting local economic growth, improving people's quality of life and protecting Stainforth's natural environment.. A neighbourhood plan would give Stainforth a greater say in how/where houses, roads, businesses etc are built. The event was attended by 33 people with the heads of 11 organisations and charities including: Stainforth Town Council, DMBC Councillors, Church of England St Mary's, Roeville (IT Company), Hatfield Main Heritage Trust, Stainforth Post Office, SERV, Life Church, Stainforth 4 ALL and Dr Anderson's Players. A presentation was held explaining what a neighbourhood plan is and how it could benefit Stainforth. Later, there was a huge buffet for everyone to have a bite to eat and discuss the neighbourhood plan which had an overwhelming positive response.

So, what's included on what we can decide on? **ENVIRONMENT:** There's ideas to improve and add a country park to Stainforth with the help of this plan. **COMMUNITY FACILITIES:** For Stainforth this could mean building a bridge from the train station to Waggon's Way and having a connecting road from M18 to Stainforth. **ECONOMY:** No more take-aways opening in Stainforth! We've got enough, don't you think?



HOUSING: Building new housing and deciding what type they are plus where they'd be built. It also includes saving those precious historic buildings in Stainforth! We've already lost so many including Stainforth's Market. We need to keep these gems to remember this history of our town. One historic site is the Hatfield Main Colliery – this is one of the only pits left in the Doncaster area and we should treasure it! There's plans to restore it to its former glory, have a museum, café and outdoor area. There's even talks about it becoming a wedding venue!

Hatfield and Stainforth Station

Stainforth Town Council has the formal power and responsibility for preparation for the neighbourhood plan, but don't worry! It has not cost the council any money to do this as funding is coming from an organisation called Locality. Who are they you might ask? Locality is the national network of ambitious and enterprising community-led organisations, working together to help neighbourhoods thrive.

If you're a little confused with the process of a neighbourhood plan, which it can be! We've broken it into 5 main stages:

1. Agree the Neighbourhood Area – Must be registered and recognised by DMBC
2. Preparing the Plan – With the help of DMBC and Locality funding
3. Independent check – Checked by external auditor
4. Community Referendum – One yes/no question: “Do you want DMBC to use the neighbourhood plan for Stainforth to help it decide planning applications in the Stainforth area?”
5. Making the Plan – If accepted by the referendum DMBC must accept the plan into their framework

TOUR DE YORKSHIRE IS COMING TO STAINFORTH

Tour de Yorkshire

Tour de Yorkshire 2018 is coming to Stainforth! Starting on 3rd May in Beverley, racers will cycle through to the seaside resort of Hornsea and tackle a 16km loop before heading back to Beverley and into the Yorkshire Wolds. They will then cycle upwards at Baggaby Hill before descending into Pocklington for the first opening sprint. After passing through Holme-on-Spalding Moor before the second sprint in Howden. It's then full steam through Rawcliffe, Skyehouse and finally into our local area of Fishlake, Stainforth, Hatfield, Hatfield Woodhouse before making their final push into Doncaster on the newly opened Great Yorkshire Way, sweeping past the famous Doncaster Racecourse before a flat-out finish along South Parade. It's the second time Tour De Yorkshire has come to Doncaster, the last being in April 2016.

Tour de Yorkshire originally started as a legacy event following the highly successful 2014 visit of Tour de France to Yorkshire. Since its launch in 2015 Tour de Yorkshire has had a significant benefit to Yorkshire in money gain and exposure to the rest of the world. In 2015 it generated £50 million, £60 million in 2016 and in 2017 a whopping £64 million!



It was estimated that the broadcast of the event was watched by 9.7 million across the world with over 2 million spectators lining the route

SERV VOLUNTEERS CLEANS UP

STAINFORTH VOLUNTEERS

You may have noticed Stainforth looking cleaner in the past few months, well that's all down to SERV (Stainforth Environmental Regeneration Volunteers). If you haven't heard of them before they are a team of volunteers, that are completely self-run.

We spoke to leader of SERV Fred Turner, 61, "something needed to be done about the litter problem here, it was beyond a joke how much there was. I've lived in Stainforth all my life and I take pride in where I live, but seems others don't and just throw rubbish on the ground."

SERV go out every Monday and Thursday and since their launch in March 2017 they have already collected 10 TONNES of rubbish! Which is the same weight of two elephants! This isn't including all the fly-tipping items they've taken away either! Volunteer Dave said "Compared to how it used to be it's a huge difference I think it'll carry on getting better when we get more support."

Over time the cleaning team have been getting more recognition and support from local people, especially on Facebook.

With more and more support it seems SERV is not just having an impact on locals but with the DMBC council - their road sweepers have been spotted more often in Stainforth.

**New Steps To Tackle
Illegal Waste And
Fly-tipping Announced**

Not only that but in recent headlines there's going to be new steps to tackle illegal waste and fly-tipping. Proposals includes giving local authorities rights to fine fly-tippers fixed-penalties rather than the courts having to do it, which is a lengthy process. New blue recycling bins have also started being delivered.

They will be used for paper, cardboard, tins, cans, foil, empty aerosols, plastic bottles, and liquid food cartons. Green boxes will be for glass bottles and jars only. Electrical items like toasters, kettles are also being collected from now on as well as clothes, shoes, towels and bedsheets. These need to be put into a plastic bag next to your blue bin or green box. This new service will be done every two weeks.

We spoke to SERV's volunteers on the their thoughts about the litter:

Are you shocked with the amount of litter you have collected over the past year?

"I knew it was bad but I didn't realise

how much waste a small town could create" - Dave, 56.

How come you started to volunteer for SERV?

"I used to get very lonely before. I don't have any family and not many friends. I used to cocoon myself in my caravan. Volunteering has helped me get out and make friends again. It's given me motivation to get out of my bed in the morning" - Barry, 65.

Has it changed the way you deal with your waste?

"Yeah, me and my mum recycle way more now and we re-use bags and have cut down on plastic. I don't litter anyway but I will never litter in my life again. I don't know how people just throw rubbish on the ground" - Jacob, 15.

If you were to tell others why to volunteer what would you say?

"It makes you have more pride in where you live. If others volunteered it makes you realise everyone needs to work together to tackle the litter problem. Over time hopefully less people will litter." - Jacob, 15.

ME & QIGONG

Want to try something new this year? As well as get fit and healthy? Try Qigong! If you haven't got a clue what Qigong is or even how to pronounce it, we've got all the information you need and why you should give it a go!

Pronounced as "Chee-Gung" it roots from Chinese medicine and is a holistic system of coordinated body posture and movement, breathing, and meditation used for health, spirituality and martial arts training.

We spoke to two learners Anne Sylvester and Ann Brown about why they like Qigong and what's the most positive impact they've got from it:

"I like doing it with other like-minded people. The pace is suited to me as well, it's not

too fast. But the main thing I've got out of it is I have less pain in my knee. I've got really bad arthritis and since doing Qigong from after Christmas I'm on half the amount of pain killers." – Anne Sylvester

"3 years ago, I got Gallbladder problems. I had to be put to sleep and was in critical care for 2 weeks. I started having nightmares because of all the medicine they were giving me, it made my mind go haywire. I was just in and out of hospital from October till April. Doing Qigong has helped me a lot, at the start I couldn't shut my eyes because I'm still scared of the dark but now I can. I might seem silly to others but it's a really big step for me. I still have to sleep with a light on and the door open when I'm at home because I'm frightened."

"It brings back memories of being in that hospital room again. Doing QiGong is therapeutic, it's been greatly positive for me so far – I'm excited what's to come." – Ann Brown



WARWICK CASTLE

THE WELL named Saxon Travel arrived for us in front of the library at eight a.m. after Stainforth 4 ALL's bigwigs bustled around loading crisps, soft drinks and handing back deposits to travellers who had turned up and were about to pass 'go' on our journey to the Centre of Mediaeval England. Chairman, Fred Turner, noted down all arrivals, handed out five pounds and waved us off before we moved off for two hours of steady motorway on our journey south.

Children on board were soon involved in word games involving memory skills whilst others played on their mobile phones or tablets. Our destination was the Norman castle of Warwick, once the home of Warwick the Kingmaker whose word once made or unmade kings. Before we left the coach, children were handed a quiz sheet with questions by Mrs Bedford, fa-

miliar to some as the lady who supervises work on Saturday mornings in the library when she helps children keep up with their school work. A quiz sheet? Was this to be an extension of school? No, this was a history teacher's (and a child's) dream. Once we had penetrated the gatehouse we were in another world.

Mysterious mediaeval music wafted over us as we made our way towards the different activities. Jousting by knights in costume, a trebuchet hurling rocks for 150 yards, birds of prey hovering over us, a 'Horrible History' play which set the scene and a water wheel which later in its career helped power early electricity for the castle around the year 1900. Children wandering about in costumes, they had persuaded their parents to buy, only added to the atmosphere.



Others clutched swords which they waved at intruders from the battlements. Inside the castle a wide range of ages walked through the stately home parts of the castle where the earls of Warwick had lived a more leisurely life than their Norman ancestors. Tables were set with silver cutlery and beautiful glass ware as if they were awaiting the family's return. We walked through bedrooms with magnificently carved furniture and staterooms hung with pictures going back to the Civil War between the Roundheads and the Cavaliers.

Of course, our focus was on the Wars of the Roses and we were encouraged to cheer for the Houses of York and Lancas-

ter whose banners were everywhere. Knowledgeable staff explained how things worked and what life was like in the middle ages to an audience which had not just come from Stainforth but also, from their voices, from across Europe, North America and even China. What a pleasant way of appreciating history.

By five o'clock we were leaving the coach back at the library laden with memories and photographs of our time in the middle ages.
